
What do you love about your current job?


How many years have you worked there?

Over half (54.6%) of respondents have worked 2 years or less. High turnover in roles.




Do you work from home?

41% are happy with the balance of working from home vs in the office




Do you want to work (from home)?

25% of respondents are happy in the office full time. 75% want at least some days a week from home




Do you work for a company in the Manawatū region?
